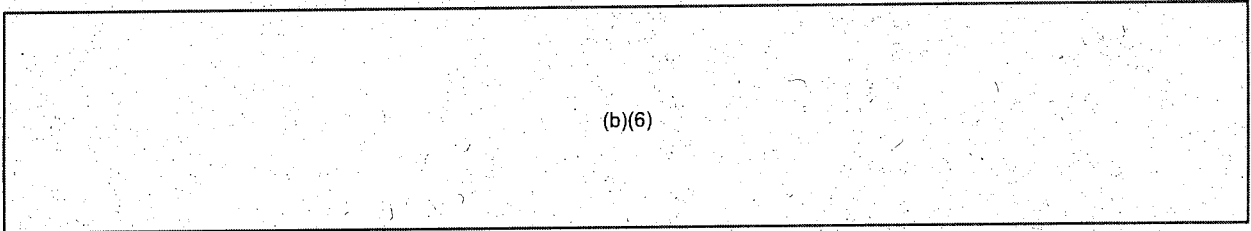

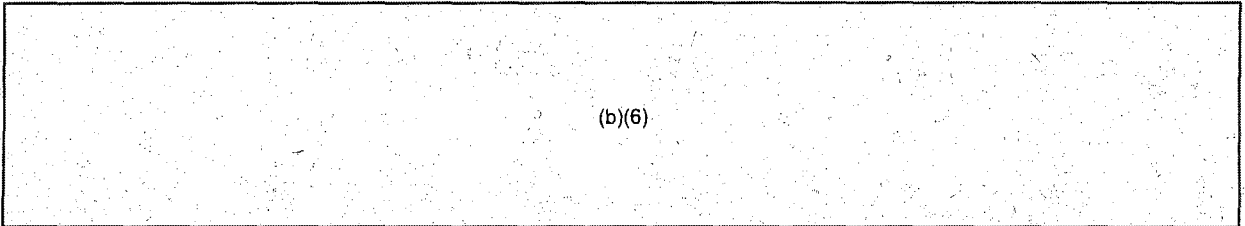

Good morning.

It's the Fourth of July this coming week – a proud day for all Americans. Two hundred and twenty-five years ago, the Continental Congress adopted the Declaration of Independence. That document's bold words defined our Nation and inspire the world.

But words alone did not secure America's independence. In 1776, liberty had to be defended by brave soldiers and sailors at the risk of their lives. And liberty is still defended by brave men and women today.

Much has changed over the past two centuries for the people who wear the uniform of the United States. Our armed forces have grown into the mightiest on earth and their responsibilities extend all over the world. Yet the courage and patriotism of our servicemen and women are as sure and strong as ever. And we owe them the same appreciation that we feel for the soldiers of Bunker Hill, Valley Forge, and Yorktown.

We owe them fair salaries, first-class health benefits, and decent housing.

And what we owe, we will pay. This past week I announced an amended budget request for the Department of Defense in 2002: \$32.6 billion more than in 2001 to improve the training, readiness, and quality of life of our troops. This is the biggest defense increase since the Reagan buildup of the mid-1980s. For too many years, our strength has dwindled. Now we are rebuilding once again – and our first priority is the well-being of our men and women in uniform.

Two-thirds of our military family housing units are listed by the Department of Defense as being in poor condition. This must change.

We have other defense priorities too. Secretary Rumsfeld is completing a review of the mission and structure of our armed forces. Soon we will be proposing a new defense strategy for a new age – a strategy that recognizes that the Cold War is over, but that threats to our security still

remain. We are consulting with our allies, with Russia, and with others on a defense system that will protect our country, our forces, and our friends from missile attack – and from nuclear blackmail.

It is time for fresh thinking and rapid change in our national defense – to prepare for challenges that are changing just as quickly.

But one thing will never change: the quality and dedication of the men and women who wear America's uniform. They give their best – they are the best – and they deserve the best. There's no greater honor for a President than to serve as commander in chief. And my budget priorities reflect the pride I feel in the outstanding people who serve and protect us all.

I urge the Congress to promptly approve my defense request, which will assure better pay, better housing, and better healthcare for our armed forces.

And I wish you and your family a happy and safe Fourth of July.

I. PURPOSE

To discuss the policy initiatives of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops/United States Catholic Conference with Bishop Joseph Fiorenza (President) and Bishop Wilton Gregory (President-elect).

II. BACKGROUND

The National Conference of Catholic Bishops held its annual meeting June 12-14, 2001, in Atlanta, Georgia. Bishop Fiorenza has served as the President of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops since 1998. His term will end later this year.

Bishop Fiorenza leads the Diocese of Galveston-Houston, composed of ten counties in southeastern Texas. It includes Harris County and the City of Houston as well as Galveston County, the Mother Seat of the Church in Texas. More than 1.3 million Catholics live within diocesan boundaries, making the Diocese the largest in the state of Texas and the tenth largest in the United States.

Bishop Gregory is the President-elect of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops and is the seventh Bishop to lead the Diocese of Belleville, Illinois. The Diocese of Belleville encompasses 28 counties in Southern Illinois, of which the population is 12 percent Catholic.

The National Conference of Catholic Bishops (NCCB) and the United States Catholic Conference (USCC) are the organizations of the American Catholic hierarchy. Through these distinct but closely related organizations – one a canonical entity, the other a civil corporation – the bishops fulfill their responsibilities of leadership and service to Church and nation.

The programs of NCCB/USCC range over the spectrum of Catholic concerns – from prayers and worship to the state of the economy, from revitalizing parishes to averting nuclear war, from promoting vocations to protecting life at all stages.

Once every two years, the USCC Office of Government Liaison prepares a legislative program for the new Congress. This is done in close consultation with the various NCCB/USCC Committees and with the staff responsible for the various public policy issues. The legislative issues are then reviewed and approved by the USCC Administrative Board.

The National Conference of Catholic Bishops was one of the first to issue a letter of support for H.R. 7, "The Community Solutions Act."

The Bishops are pleased with the Administration's early efforts on life. The NCCB opposes legislation to provide Federal funding for experiments involving destruction of human embryos.

The NCCB believes refugees fleeing from persecution should have special standing and consideration. The NCCB also believes family reunification should be the basis of our immigration policy. They think the Administration, when addressing the problem of undocumented migration, should factor in the political, social, and economic inequities that exist in certain countries.

The NCCB opposes capital punishment. They support the inclusion of DNA evidence in the appeals process.

While they have not taken a side in the Patients' Bill of Rights debate, the NCCB supports legislation that will provide affordable and accessible healthcare for all, focusing heavily on the uninsured.

I. PURPOSE

To sign a proclamation honoring Black Music Month and to salute the contributions black music artists and industry leaders have made to the educational process and to faith-based and community initiatives.

II. BACKGROUND

June is Black Music Month. During Black Music Month, Americans take time to recognize the talent and contributions of black musicians, vocalists, writers, and producers who have shaped jazz, gospel, spirituals, rap, rock 'n' roll, and rhythm and blues.

The ceremony will include many known musical artists, including Mya (who performed at the Ford Theatre tribute earlier this month), music companies executives, African-American leaders, and musical students from the Duke Ellington School of the Arts.

The event is a two-tier event with an Oval Office ceremony with the honorees followed by a ceremonial proclamation signing and musical performances in the East Room.

Good afternoon, and welcome to the White House. Thank you all for being here. Above all, Laura and I welcome this rare collection of entertainers with us today.

It is a privilege to host this event in the White House – especially here in the East Room, where so many of the world's great artists have performed. And I understand that we are about to witness the superb talent of the next generation, being shaped every day at the Duke Ellington School of Music. Thank you for sharing your gifts here at the White House.

We're so pleased to have with us Evangelist Shirley Caesar, whose voice has reached across the world, and whose ministry has changed so many lives.

The same can be said of her fellow Grammy winner, Dr. Bobby Jones, a legend of gospel music, and a witness for the Gospel.

Nancy Wilson was not able to join us, but we honor her today for her distinctive voice and style, and for her giving heart. Lena Horne could not be here either, but her name alone calls to mind a beautiful lady and a voice like no other.

We do have Lionel Hampton with us. Laura and I welcome him to Washington, just as Harry and Bess Truman did, when Lionel performed at

the 1949 Inaugural Ball. The Johnsons, the Nixons, and the Reagans, among other first families, all invited Lionel here as well. Presidents come and go, but there is only one "Vibes President of the United States."

Lionel Hampton is an old friend of our family – going all the way back to my father's boyhood. On a couple of occasions, he and my grandfather did a few numbers together. As Lionel will tell you, my grandfather had a fine singing voice. As Laura will tell you, that family trait did not survive. Lionel, welcome back.

A lot of other greats have passed through the White House, including America's ambassador of goodwill, Louis Armstrong. In this room, Pearl Bailey was introduced to Mikhail Gorbachev by Ronald Reagan, who said simply, "This is our Pearl." Eubie Blake played Ragtime piano on the South Lawn. These chandeliers trembled to the high notes of Ella Fitzgerald. And on a memorable evening here in the East Room, Duke Ellington himself received the Presidential Medal of Freedom – a fitting tribute to the son of a White House butler.

Today we pay homage to an American tradition, and a tradition only America could have produced. Spirituals, jazz, R&B, and hip-hop are performed, heard, and loved in every part of the world. But they belong to our country in a way that no other music does.

Trace the roots of Black American music, and you arrive at the same place: with a people held in bondage, denied schooling, and kept away from every other opportunity. Yet out of all that suffering came the early spirituals – some of the sweetest praise ever lifted up to Heaven. In those songs, humanity will always hear the voice of hope in the face of injustice.

Since those early days, the music of Black Americans has told many other stories in many other styles. And from Scott Joplin to Jelly Roll Morton, from Marian Anderson to Aretha Franklin, from Nat King Cole to the Neville Brothers, from Dizzy Gillespie to Sam Cooke, from Kathleen Battle to Gladys Knight – we hear music that's easy to enjoy, but impossible to imitate.

A story is told about Louis Armstrong. Someone came up to the legendary Satchmo one day and asked him to define jazz. They wanted to

understand it, so they came to the master himself. He replied, "Man, if you gotta ask, you'll never know."

On behalf of the American people, I now have the pleasure to sign the proclamation celebrating Black Music Month.

Mistress of Ceremonies and Legend and Student Honorees

Debbie Allen – Mistress of Ceremonies

- Debbie Allen has excelled as an actress, director, producer, choreographer, singer, and dancer. Most recently, she published her first children's book, *Brothers of the Knight*.
- Allen's latest film work was the successful and highly acclaimed Dreamworks production, *Amistad*, a story about a famed mutiny on a slave ship in 1839.
- Allen holds the distinction of having choreographed the Academy Awards for five consecutive years.

Evangelist Shirley Caesar – Legend Honoree

- Shirley Caesar is the second African American woman to win the coveted Grammy Award for a gospel performance. Evangelist Caesar has won 10 Grammys, 17 Doves, 12 Stellar awards, and numerous other honors.
- As Pastor to a growing church and the leader of a thriving ministry, Evangelist Caesar donates a sizable portion of all concert proceeds to the needy, both in her own community and elsewhere.

Dr. Bobby Jones – Legend Honoree

- Bobby Jones Gospel, seen on BET since November 1980, is the first and only nationally-syndicated black gospel television show, and Jones' Video Gospel is the only national television outlet gospel artists have to show their videos.
- In his teaching days, Jones helped develop the idea for a Black Expo in Nashville, Tennessee. (Black Expo is a fair held in cities across the country focusing on contributions African Americans have made to their communities.)

Lionel Hampton – Legend Honoree

- Lionel Hampton, a world-renowned vibraphonist, drummer, and bandleader, was born in Louisville, Kentucky, on April 20, 1909.
- Hampton helped pioneer the racial integration of jazz. Hampton's band also was the first black band to tour the racially segregated South with a white singer in 1950.

Lena Horne – Legend Honoree (in absentia)

- Lena Horne began performing at age six and appeared as a dancer in the chorus line of the famous Cotton Club. She has performed on Broadway and Carnegie Hall and became an international superstar for her appearance in films. Among her many achievements and

honors are Grammy Awards for the soundtrack to her 1982 comeback revue "The Lady and Her Music" and a Lifetime Achievement award.

Nancy Wilson – Legend Honoree (in absentia)

- Over the years, Nancy Wilson has contributed her time and energy to causes such as the Martin Luther King Center for Social Change, the Cancer Society, and the National Heart Association.

Regina de Ocampo – Student Honoree

- The Salutatorian of the 2001 class, Regina was a vocal music student at the Ellington school and will attend the University of Michigan in the fall. Regina is also a licensed scuba diver and teaches tennis and karate to disabled children.

Lauren Dawson – Student Honoree

- Lauren graduated fifth in her class from the Ellington School. She was a member of the Show and Concert choirs and served as school president. Lauren was named Most Outstanding Vocalist and Math Student and will attend the University of Michigan in the fall.

Danielle Weatherford – Student Honoree

- Danielle is the valedictorian of the Class of 2001. As a flutist, she has traveled, performed, and recorded with the Ellington Symphonic Wind Ensemble. Her goals are to graduate from college with honors and become a member of an orchestra and an entertainment lawyer.

Performers

Regina Belle – Celebrity Performer

- Regina Belle Battle is a four-time Grammy Winner for her duet with Peabo Bryson, “A Whole New World,” from the Disney movie *Aladdin*. She is New Jersey-born and Baptist Church-bred and has one of the most respected and exemplary careers in Rhythm and Blues.

Take Six – Celebrity Performers

(Claude McKnight III, Mark Kibble, Joey Kibble, Alvin Chea, Cedric Dent, David Thomas)

- With its roots in gospel and doo wop, Grammy Award-winner Take Six is a sophisticated jazz-influenced singing group.

Duke Ellington School of Arts

The Duke Ellington School of the Arts is an award-winning public high school in the District of Columbia that combines both academic and artistic curricula and is the recipient of the prestigious Blue Ribbon of Excellence Award from the U.S. Department of Education.

Ellington focuses on inner city youth and has demonstrated that the lives of inner city students can be transformed by the discipline and energy required by artistic training and by high expectations of achievement.

- Ellington has virtually no violence problems.
- Ellington has a dropout rate of less than one percent and the fourth highest standardized test scores in the District of Columbia.
- Over 90 percent of Ellington students are accepted to colleges and universities each year.

Artists in the Audience

Boyz II Men

(Nathan Morris, Michael McCary, Shawn Stockman and Wanya Morris)

- Boyz II Men started singing in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania and have now become the best-selling R&B Group ever (the RIAA) and artist 90's (Billboard Magazine).

Chuck Brown

- Chuck Brown, affectionately known as the Godfather of Go-Go, created the Go-Go sound. This non-stop dance music has gained Chuck Brown worldwide fans. Chuck Brown began his musical career in the early 1960's and is still performing today.

James Brown

- James Brown has always donated portions of his profits to black neighborhood projects. He believed strongly in integration and reports proudly of the auditoriums he "integrated."

Isaac Hayes

- In 1992, Isaac Hayes became the international spokesman for the World Literacy Crusade, speaking to people about the possibility of hope, higher education, and employment without the need for guns or violence. He has also adopted a Harlem high school to be involved in.

Jennifer Holliday

- Jennifer Holliday is best known for her Tony-winning role in the 1982 musical *Dreamgirls*, a thinly disguised adaptation of the Supremes story. Her success in the musical prompted Holliday's solo career. She also starred in musical *Grease* in the 1990s.

Mya

- Mya speaks regularly about teen issues, in particular self-esteem for young women. In that capacity Mya serves on the advisory board of the Secret to Self-Esteem program (an alliance between the Partnership of Women's Health and Secret antiperspirant).

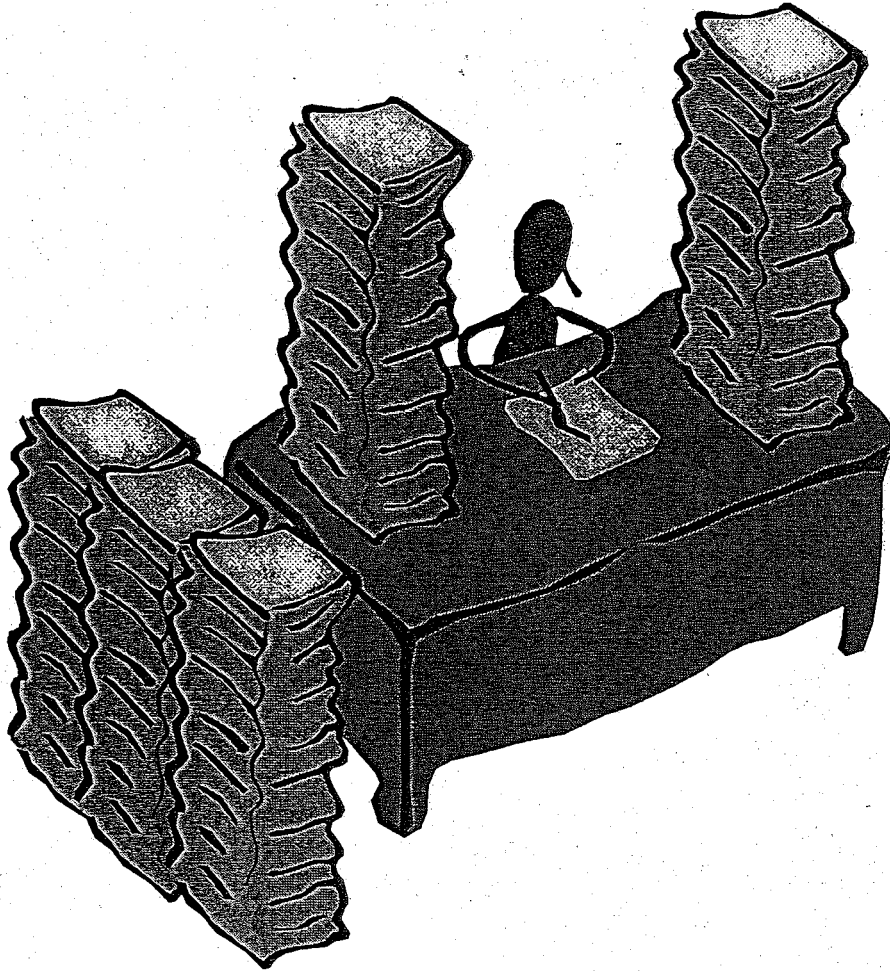
Queen Latifah
