# Kerry takes the field

In Anaheim visit, the Democratic presidential hopeful criticizes Bush's energy policy

**D**EMOCRATIC presidential candidate John Kerry said Thursday that the federal government should buy back undeveloped oil leases off the California coast in order to halt new oil drilling.

Appearing at a fund-raiser before the Democratic Foundation of Orange County at Edison Field's Diamond Club, the senator from Massachusetts sharply criticized President George W. Bush for pushing for drilling in California while protecting Florida.

"You should not have to have a brother who is governor to do the right thing," Kerry told about 150 people who paid \$65 a plate, many of whom also attended a \$1,000

per head reception before-hand.

Bush said last year that \$235 million would be spent to buy up oil leases in Florida - an announcement made with his brother, Florida

Gov. Jeb Bush, at his side during a break from Jeb Bush's re-election campaign.

In California, meanwhile, Gov. Gray Davis is seeking to review 36 undeveloped leases to study potential environmental impacts before they are reissued by the federal government. The Bush administration has tried to proceed without the review - but has lost two legal rounds and is now considering taking the

matter to the Supreme Court.

Davis wrote to Bush on Thursday, urging him to set aside further legal challenge and allow the review.

The White House referred calls to the Interior Department.

No one could be reached for comment at the department regarding the Kerry or Davis oil issues.

Kerry, on a two-day fund-raising trip to Southern California, was making his first public appearances since prostate cancer surgery Feb. 12. He was jovial and energetic, telling a string of jokes before launching into his formal speech, and peppering that speech with anecdotes.

He spoke for 40 minutes, then talked with reporters before leaving for a San Diego fund-raiser. He attended three Los Angeles fund-raisers Wednesday.

Kerry emphasized the need to develop alternative sources of energy. He said that just 10 percent of the world's oil is produced in the United States, with 65 percent in Arab countries.

"There is no possible way for America to drill its way out of this problem," he said. "We have to invent our way out of this."

Kerry is among the front runners for the Democratic nomination, along with Sen. Joe Lieberman of Connecticut and John Edwards of North Carolina, and Rep. Dick Gephardt of Missouri.

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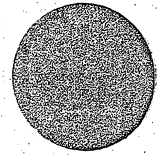

Dear Mr. President:

In December, Fred Smith (CEO, FedEx), Michael Armstrong (Chairman, Comcast, and former CEO, AT&T), and I co-chaired a CEO Summit under the auspices of Booz Allen Hamilton. The CEO summit was attended with representation from our most critical industries, including financial services, energy, communications, and the transportation sectors. The Summit focused on:

- How, in the aftermath of September 11, 2001, government and private industry can more effectively work together to secure the nation's infrastructure and help prevent, or at the least minimize the effects of, any future terrorist attacks on our country.
- How the current threat environment has altered and added to the risks faced by private industry, and how it requires bold responses.

The purpose of the attached short report of our meeting is to share some initial thoughts and suggestions with you in the hopes of strengthening the dialogue between the public and private sectors. We plan to meet again, including other CEO's in our efforts, and we hope thus to help build and foster partnerships both within industry and with the government to enhance business resilience, protect our economy, and promote national security. We concentrated on three areas, spelled out in the short attachment: what business can do on its own, what government can do, and what we can do together.

We would be happy to meet with Governor Ridge or anyone you might designate in the Administration to discuss the group's recommendations in detail and any further ways we might be helpful.

### **CEO Summit: Initial Thoughts and Suggestions**

#### **1. What Business Can Do On Its Own**

- Forge collective agreements within industries, possibly coordinated by their trade associations, on actions to cope with national security emergencies – early emphasis should be placed on industries on which many others depend.
- Use enhancements in corporate accountability to encourage businesses to adopt resilience improvements and protect the key operations that drive their earnings and hence the economy.
- Search out alternative supply chain links to which businesses can turn in the event of an emergency.
- Expand participation in the CEO Com Link (Critical Emergency Operations Communications Link), a secure telecom system enabling CEOs to communicate with each other and with government officials during a crisis.

#### **2. What The Government Can Do**

- Encourage R&D and investments in new technologies promoting security and resiliency and use government purchases to promote the commercialization of these technologies.
- Offer economic incentives for stockpiling materials, such as transformers for the electricity grid, specifically purchased to keep critical industries operating after a terrorist attack.
- Bring back 30-year bonds (War Bonds) using a WW II-like bond drive to help finance economic incentives for industry and to allow purchasers to feel they are helping in the war effort.
- Develop ways to share relevant intelligence with the private sector and at the same time seek out and include open source intelligence and private

sector vulnerability assessments in the decision-making process when planning against future attacks and crises.

- Increase its own ability to make sound decisions about infrastructure resilience and security issues by recruiting for government laboratories, FFRDC's, or other government positions some of the talented engineers and high-tech experts who are recently retired, available as "dollar-a-year" volunteers, or available because of transitional unemployment in telecomm and other fields.

### 3. What Public/Private Sector Partnerships Can Do

- Look for ways to create incentives for improving resilience and thus help avoid the us-versus-them mind-set attendant on regulation and control.
- Support one another in ensuring that remedies are solidly based on careful assessments of threats and vulnerabilities, not on temporary or superficial appeal. For example, develop less-than-drastic responses to crises that don't necessarily shut down entire systems (e.g., all airports, entire computer networks), but rather, keeping an eye on cost, determine the probable scope of the threat and reasonable responses, particularly for operations central to the economy.
- Form alliances to mesh corporate continuity of operations programs with continuity of government programs, using joint task forces to study and accomplish specific tasks.
- Hold government-sponsored sessions with industries having similar security needs to develop contingency plans for continuity of supply chains (for food, pharmaceuticals), continuity of communications networks (for transportation, finance), etc.
- Set up direct lines of communication between the government and trade groups so that crucial information can be disseminated, as well as gathered, quickly and efficiently.
- Prioritize resilience improvements, with advice from industry, so weaknesses that can be catastrophically exploited (e.g., flimsy cockpit doors) get fixed first.

from Charles Bartlett**

I write to convey the sum of talks with a large number of friends who have one thing in common: they all voted for you; many consider themselves really good friends who would like to count themselves ready to go to the well with you. But they do not relish the notion of going into Iraq with you unless we have UN backing. Their general feeling is that you are presiding over a foreign policy that is more reflective of the expansionist, zionist zeal of your neo-cons and the snotty nationalism of your right-wingers than it is of your own character and personality.

These people, like myself, want a George W. Bush foreign policy which reflects the same cohesive, embrasive warmth and sensitivity that have marked you as a person and as governor of Texas. The George Bush whom we know would not be viewed, as you are now in England, as standing equal to Saddam Hussein as a threat to peace. It cannot be pleasant for you and I hate to have the country in the position of being hated in wide areas of the world. It is really time to pull the check-reins on some of these characters who took office with you. We badly need to reach out to the rest of the world, not to do battle with it.

## STATEMENT ON IRAQ

**Most Reverend Wilton D. Gregory**  
**President**  
**United States Conference of Catholic Bishops**

**February 26, 2003**

As our nation and world face grave choices about war, peace, security and justice, this is a time for renewed prayer, continued moral reflection, and active and faithful citizenship. This is a time to reaffirm and raise again the serious ethical questions and concerns our Conference has expressed in a letter to President Bush last September and in a major statement of the full body of bishops last November.

We have no illusions about the behavior and intentions of, or dangers posed by, the Iraqi government. Once again, we renew our calls for the Iraqi leadership clearly to abandon efforts to develop weapons of mass destruction and to meet its obligations to destroy such weapons. We join with Pope John Paul II in insisting that Iraq make concrete commitments to meet the legitimate demands of the international community and to avoid war. The Iraqi regime has to recognize that it has not to date responded adequately to these demands and that it must act immediately and effectively to meet them, both to avoid armed conflict and to prove that it intends to change its ways.

We join with Pope John Paul in the conviction that war is not inevitable and that war is always a defeat for humanity. This is not a matter of ends, but means. Our bishops conference continues to question the moral legitimacy of any preemptive, unilateral use of military force to overthrow the government of Iraq. To permit preemptive or preventive uses of military force to overthrow threatening or hostile regimes would create deeply troubling moral and legal precedents. Based on the facts that are known, it is difficult to justify resort to war against Iraq, lacking clear and adequate evidence of an imminent attack of a grave nature or Iraq's involvement in the terrorist attacks of September 11. With the Holy See and many religious leaders throughout the world, we believe that resort to war would not meet the strict conditions in Catholic teaching for the use of military force.

In our judgment, resort to war in this case should have broad international support. As crucial decisions draw near, we join the Holy See in once again urging all leaders to step back from the brink of war and to continue to work through the United Nations to contain, deter and disarm Iraq. We hope and pray that leaders in Iraq, the United Nations and in our own land will hear and heed the persistent pleas of Pope John Paul II to take concrete steps to avoid war and build peace based on respect for international law and for all human life.

If the decision to use military force is taken, the moral and legal constraints on the conduct of war must be observed. This is expected of every civilized nation. It surely is expected of ours. We are threatened by regimes and terrorists who ignore traditional norms governing the use of force; all the more reason that we must uphold and reinforce them through our own actions. Any implied or express threats to defend against Iraq's weapons of mass destruction by using our own weapons of mass destruction would be clearly unjustified. The use of anti-personnel landmines, cluster bombs and other weapons that cannot distinguish between soldiers and civilians, or between times of war and times of peace, should also be avoided. In all our actions in war, including assessments of whether collateral damage is proportionate, we must value the lives and livelihood of Iraqi civilians as we would the lives and livelihood of our own families and our own citizens.

If there is armed conflict, we must be prepared for all of its implications and its aftermath. An already long-suffering Iraqi population could face terrible new burdens, and a region already full of conflict and refugees could see more conflict and many more refugees, with ethnic and religious minorities particularly vulnerable. A post-war Iraq would require a long-term commitment to reconstruction, humanitarian and refugee assistance, and establishment of a stable, democratic government at a time when the U.S. federal budget is overwhelmed by increased defense spending and the costs of war.

As pastors and teachers, we understand that there are no easy answers. People of good will may differ on how traditional norms apply in this situation. The gravity of the threat and whether force would be preemptive are matters of debate, as are the potential consequences of using or failing to use military force. We urge Catholics, especially lay men and women who are called to be leaven in society, to continue to think deeply about the choices we face, to review carefully the teaching of our Church and to speak out strongly in accord with their conscience. Our hearts and prayers go out especially to those who may bear the burden of these terrible choices -- the men and women of our armed forces and their families, the people of Iraq, and the leaders of our nation and world who face momentous decisions of life and death, of war and peace.

At times like these, we turn to the Lord and ask for wisdom and courage. We Christians are called to be sentinels of peace, the Holy Father reminds us. We join with him in urging Catholics to dedicate fasting on Ash Wednesday for the conversion of hearts and the long-range vision of just decisions to resolve disputes with adequate and peaceful means. In the days ahead, our community of faith is called to reflection and discernment, dialogue and action, and especially to prayer and worship. As we approach the Lenten season, let us pray and fast that our nation and world will find effective ways short of war to secure justice, increase security and promote genuine peace for all of God's people.

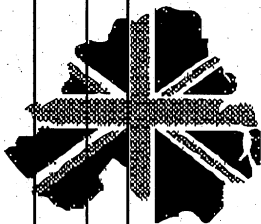

## **House of Commons Debate on Iraq – February 26, 2003**

**Mr. David Trimble (Upper Bann):** I should make it clear at the outset that my hon. Friends and I will support the Government in the Division Lobby this evening. The Government have said that this motion is not a vote for war, but we are under no illusion about the fact that it is a further step along a route that might end in war. We do not support such a motion lightly, therefore, because we are well aware of the consequences that might flow from it. Indeed, all right hon. and hon. Members will be deeply conscious of the fact that thousands of servicemen are on their way to the Gulf, and we know what the consequences for them may be. I remark parenthetically that among those going to the Gulf are the two Irish regiments: the Royal Irish Regiment and the Irish Guards. Consequently, well in excess of 1,000 people from Northern Ireland—and, indeed, a not insignificant number from the Republic of Ireland—will shortly be deployed in the Gulf.

Time is pressing, and I want to make just a few short and simple points. We have no doubt about the nature of the regime in Iraq. I was amazed at the comment by the hon. Member for Glasgow, Kelvin (Mr. Galloway), who referred to Texas as the execution chamber of the world. Does he know nothing about Iraq? Does he know nothing about what has happened in Baghdad in the past 30 years? That was an appalling statement for him to make, and he needs to look at the regime that he has befriended a little more clearly.

We have no doubt about the threat, about the wars that have been started, or about the weapons of mass destruction that have been accumulated, and which continue to be there. There is also no doubt about what the United Nations requires. There are United Nations resolutions that require Saddam Hussein to disarm. There has certainly been a failure to comply. There was a material breach before 1441, and there is a material breach now.

What should we do? That is the question. It is only the credible threat of force that has achieved the little progress that there has been, and that has made Saddam Hussein permit the admission of inspectors. That comes after the failure of earlier UN resolutions. All the resolutions in the 1990s failed. The UN and the world community allowed themselves to be bluffed and manoeuvred out of Iraq. Against that background, 1441 had to be clear, and backed up by a credible threat of force. That credible threat has to be maintained.

The paradox is that, in order to obtain compliance with UN resolutions, there has to be the threat of force. Unless Saddam Hussein complies, it is inevitable that that force will have to be used. The time involved may be long or short, but hon. Members who have supported the UN and its resolutions, including 1441, must be aware that, as a consequence, they must support the credible use of force, right down to the point of its use. If they fail to do so, they will weaken the UN gravely.

The UN has been weakened badly enough by the failures of the 1990s. It has again set its hand to trying to carry through its will in this matter, and it must succeed. If not, enormous damage will be done to the possibility that the UN can be credible in the future, and that will have implications for world peace. The paradox is that those who want peace and a UN that succeeds in the world must therefore support the Government, right down to the use of force if that becomes necessary.

I appreciate that some people find that difficult to live with. Some of those who are reluctant to go down the route that I have described are well meaning, and others are engaged in wishful thinking. We have seen some evidence of that in the debate.

Other people are influenced by less noble motives. I have been distressed by the degree of anti-Americanism that has been expressed in the debate, and the personal hostility to the President. I consider that wholly misplaced. I have been appalled at some of the comments about President Bush, and at the false caricature of him that has been presented. I base that opinion not only on the fleeting personal acquaintance that I have had with him, but on what he has said and done over the past couple of years, which I have looked at closely.

The record is clear, especially in the period since 11 September. The US has moved slowly, deliberately and proportionately. That is the evidence of the past year and a half. I have listened to the caricatures of President Bush that have been presented, and I think that hon. Members should get away from the propaganda—coming from elements in the American Democrat party—that they have swallowed. They should look at things a little more clearly.

People have been concerned about what will happen in Iraq and the region if force has to be used. However, we must realise that the region is highly unstable. That is another of the lessons of 11 September: it brought home to us just how unstable the region is. We need to think about the causes of that instability, and about how we can resolve or do something to improve the situation there.

This is a complex issue, and I cannot go far into it in the couple of minutes remaining to me, but we need to ask ourselves what we can do about it. If there were no oil in the region, there would be a series of failed states there. The region has failed to deal with the challenge of modernisation.

I emphasise that I am talking about the middle east region as a whole and the Arab states there, not about Islam. A distinction must be drawn between Islam and what is happening in the middle east in respect of a particular and virulent strand of that religion. That strand is a distortion of Islam.

We need to ask why modernisation has failed. Saddam grew out of the Ba'ath socialist party, although he is, in fact, a crude anti-Semitic nationalist. Why have such people obtained and retained power? How do we change that?

I am not just talking about regime change, but asking how we change the culture in the middle east and the orientation of those states because, until we do that, we will not achieve stability. Just talking about the problem in Israel and Palestine is not terribly helpful. That problem cannot be dealt with in isolation. It is part of the instability generally, and dealing with that instability generally will make it easier to deal with Israel and Palestine; but we cannot deal with that in isolation.

The issue this evening is whether we support the Government in what they are doing—whether we want the UN resolutions to be enforced. That is the challenge. The resolutions have got to be complied with or enforced—if not complied with, then enforced—and that has to be done as and when we can to maintain the threat, and it may have to be done soon.

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## Bill Funding CPC Ultrasound Machines Introduced

*Three million dollars to open windows to the womb. A bill recently introduced in Congress would allocate \$3 million to assist pro-life crisis pregnancy center clinics in purchasing ultrasound machines.*

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When Dr. Lois Johanson, a radiologist, demonstrated how she uses the ultrasound machine at a Colorado Springs crisis pregnancy center (CPC), she said even the grainy pictures an ultrasound produces can really open the eyes of someone considering abortion.

"It helps the mom really know what it is that she's dealing with," Johanson said. "(She sees) that it really is a live little creature in there."

Tom Glessner, with the National Institute of Family and Life Advocates, helped write a new House bill that would help CPCs buy ultrasound machines.

"If we can provide the funds for these centers to obtain a machine, we're going to have more centers using them, and more women choosing life, and more babies saved from abortion," Glessner said. "The woman's natural, God-given instincts, maternal instincts take hold when she sees her baby and her baby's heartbeat."

The bill would set aside about \$3 million each year for the next four years, with the federal money paying for half the cost of each machine. That could buy about 240 ultrasound machines each year. The bill also requires that women see the images of their unborn child. To use the machines, crisis pregnancy centers must be upgraded to medical clinics, including having a licensed physician as the medical director.

Julie Parton, who heads Focus on the Family's outreach to

CPCs, said the ultrasound is a "powerful tool" to show a woman a picture of not just any baby in the womb, but her baby.

"(An ultrasound) gives reality to it," Parton said. "It completely defuses the notion that it's just a blob of tissue. You don't see blobs of tissue that have a beating heart, that have ten fingers and ten toes and are doing somersaults."

The major hurdle for the bill will likely be the U.S. Senate.

## **Hagel Praises President's Announcement on a Road Map for Israel-Palestine**

Washington, D.C. – U.S. Senator Chuck Hagel (R-NE) expressed his strong support for President Bush's personal commitment today to move ahead with a "Road Map" to help bring an end to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

"The President understands that there will be no stability in the Middle East until we get the peace process back on track. Only American leadership and engagement can get this vital process back on track," Hagel said.

President Bush said that implementation of the Road Map— developed in consultation with Russia, the United Nations and the European Union— would proceed once the Palestinian Authority has formalized the arrangements for a new Prime Minister. On Monday, the Palestinian Legislative Council (PLC) adopted an amendment to the Palestinian Basic Law creating the position of a Prime Minister.

"The Israeli and Palestinian people have suffered too long. I support the President's vision of two states, Israel and Palestine, living side-by-side, in peace and security, without terrorism and violence," Hagel added.

On another issue related to Middle East stability, Senator Hagel also supports President Bush's decision to hold a diplomatic summit with British Prime Minister Tony Blair and Spanish Prime Minister Jose Maria Aznar in the Azores Islands this weekend.

"Our allies are crucial for American diplomacy and interests in Iraq and the Middle East. I support President Bush in working with Blair, Aznar, and other allies to get a second UN Security Council resolution on Iraq," Hagel concluded.
