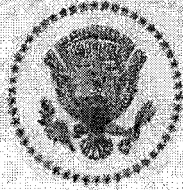

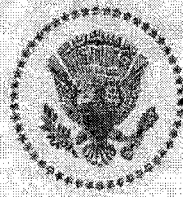

Good morning. Congratulations, Director Allbaugh. It's so nice to see Diane, Taylor, and the rest of the Allbaugh family here as well.

When I was Governor, Joe and I did a lot of traveling together. And just about everywhere we went, somebody would come up and ask Joe if he was my bodyguard. He wasn't, but to tell the truth, we always felt a little safer when he was around. That's the kind of man he is. And that's the kind of man I wanted to run FEMA.

When the worst happens anywhere in America, folks can be confident when Joe Allbaugh arrives on the scene. It's not just the commanding presence and that no-nonsense flat-top. It's his competence, his character, and his calm when trouble comes. That is not mere speculation, by the way; last Wednesday, at 10:54 in the morning, an earthquake rocked the state of Washington, injuring hundreds of people and causing billions of dollars of property damage. By 11:30 that night, Joe Allbaugh was on the scene, ready to assist people in need. That's the kind of man he is. I couldn't have made it to Washington without him – and I am honored that he has come to Washington to serve his country.

We never know where FEMA will be needed next. But we do know what makes this agency so effective: More than 2,000 dedicated employees, in offices across the country...four thousand standby employees, ready as needed...an ethic of professionalism and cooperation with state and local officials...and programs, not only to manage emergencies, but to prevent them.

As a governor, I worked with FEMA officials. Joe Allbaugh and I have great respect for Director James Lee Witt, and also for John Magaw, who has led this agency as acting director. A lot of change is needed in Washington – but here the standards are already high.

Every year, many thousands of Americans live through floods and fires and hurricanes. They know, from personal experience, that FEMA is an example of the federal government at its best. And I will tell you from

personal experience that FEMA's new director is ready for any crisis. When he acts, he will have my full confidence. When he speaks, it will inspire confidence in others.

This agency is in strong and steady hands. Joe will be at the White House many times the next few years. In the nature of his job, they won't always be the happiest of times. But Joe will help Americans deal with the worst in the best, most compassionate way possible. I thank Joe for accepting this great responsibility.

The Right Tax Cut For America

Good morning. I am delighted to have this opportunity to talk with community bankers from all over the United States who have gathered for this annual convention of the Independent Community Bankers of America. I appreciate the support that so many of you provided me in the past.

Now, I am asking for your support again. As you know, I am committed to moving major tax legislation through the Congress as soon as possible. You and your customer base – the American consumer, small businessperson, farmer, and rancher – will benefit from lower and simplified tax rates and the repeal of the death tax. The American economy will benefit.

Let me also note that I benefited from and enjoyed having Terry Jorde at my outreach meeting in Austin just before my inauguration. Terry made a powerful presentation on the funding challenges facing community financial institutions and the difficulties confronting American agriculture. Community bankers in Texas had acquainted me with these problems when I was governor.

My remarks today will address my tax relief proposal. But let me first start out by saying that the budget I recently sent to Congress

meets our obligations and funds our growing needs. Further, it has room for tax relief and debt repayment. In fact, my plan pays down \$2 trillion in debt during the next 10 years. As I said before Congress on February 27 – at the end of those 10 years, we will have paid down all the debt that is available to retire. That is more debt repaid more quickly than has ever been repaid by any nation at any time in history. But we have to worry not just about the state of our government's finances, but about the finances of America's working families as well.

About a month ago, I submitted my proposal to Congress with two principal goals in mind: reforming the tax code to provide relief and fairness for every income taxpayer and providing an insurance policy against the developing economic slowdown.

First and foremost, my tax plan provides relief to middle-class families and tears down the tollgate in the way of those seeking to enter the middle class. Right now, a single parent with two children who earns \$25,000 can keep only half of any raise. This is a demoralizing social policy. It is also bad economic policy since we cannot afford to punish the hard work that drives our economy.

To confront this, my plan doubles the child credit to \$1000 and reduces the bottom tax rate to just 10%. These changes also ensure

that a family of four making \$40,000 per year will get a minimum tax cut of \$1600. Consider what that means for families out here in the Western states suffering under mounting energy costs: For the average California family, this \$1600 will pay for 24 months worth of electrical power.

Second, the tax cut targets the owners of small, unincorporated businesses. They now pay almost 40 percent in taxes at the top rate. Additionally, these firms are now in a bit of a credit squeeze, surrendering a near-record share of internally generated funds. In order to help improve their cash flow, my plan cuts this down to 33 percent.

Third, my proposal addresses two fundamental inequities in the current tax code. One priority is to reduce the marriage penalty that now burdens working couples. Two school teachers making \$35,000 apiece face a marriage tax of \$850. My plan cuts this to zero. Another priority is to extend tax deductibility for charitable contributions to everyone. Roughly 70 percent of all taxpayers currently get no deduction. Let's encourage charitable giving in order to mobilize the non-profit sector in tackling our nation's social problems.

Finally, my plan eliminates the death tax, which is an impediment to capital formation and prohibits families from keeping their businesses and farms. A fair tax code cannot tax an individual's money three times: when the income is first earned, once again when it earns interest, and yet again upon the earner's death.

These are the priorities I laid out over a year ago during the campaign, and I still believe in their importance today. But, I'd also like to talk today about the size of the tax plan. The total cost amounts to around \$1.6 trillion over ten years, but let's put that into perspective. Over this period, the government will collect almost \$28 trillion in taxes. My plan returns about 6 percent of the expected revenue to taxpayers.

Such moderation allows my plan to fit within the budget, providing ample funding for priorities. With budget surpluses expected to total \$5.6 trillion over the next decade, my plan sets aside \$2.6 trillion to strengthen social security and retire the national debt. As a whole, this leaves more than 70 percent of the surplus for social security, debt repayment and other national priorities.

Back in December, 1999, I warned that the economy may need an insurance policy. As it turned out, the economy began weakening in the latter half of 2000. In light of continued weakening, a tax cut

now would provide a safety net for both consumers and small businesses that might face further economic distress early this year. Many members of Congress have also urged me to accelerate the tax cut, and I look forward to working with them in finding ways to provide some economy-boosting tax relief as early as possible.

Again, in addition to serving as an insurance policy against a recession, my proposal addresses issues of fundamental fairness in the tax code. The great majority of benefits are targeted at middle-income families and owners of unincorporated businesses. With consumer debt at new records and a credit crunch affecting many small businesses, the tax relief would go precisely where it is needed. I believe that this proposal is the right program for tax reform, the right program to reverse the economic slump, and the right program to provide a more equitable tax system for America.

In conclusion, I know that your leadership team of Tom Sheehan and Ken Guenther has put together a terrific convention. My thanks again for inviting me to join you. I look forward to working with you on tax policy and many other issues. Let's work to get tax relief for the American people.

Oklahoma has won 7 national championships (second behind Notre Dame). They last won the championship in 1985. In finishing as the only unbeaten team in the country, Oklahoma (13-0), beat No. 8 Nebraska, No. 9 Kansas State twice, No. 12 Texas, and also beat Texas A & M.

Josh Heupel won player of the year awards from the Associated Press, the Walter Camp Foundation and The Sporting News. Heupel came in second in the Heisman Award voting.

Coach **Bob Stoops**, received the Walter Camp Coach of the Year Award.

Softball

The Sooners defeated UCLA, 3-1, in front of a Women's College World Series record 8,049 fans at ASA Hall of Fame Stadium in Oklahoma City. They closed out the year with a 66-8 record and won eight-consecutive games in the NCAA Tournament on their way to the championship. Four players earned All-America honors, including seniors Ashli Barrett and Lisa Carey, junior Jennifer Stewart and sophomore Erin Evans. The women's softball team -- described as an "unsinkable bunch of upstarts" -- defeated UCLA 3-1 on May 29, 2000, closing out the year with a 66-8 record and winning eight consecutive games in the NCAA Tournament on their way to the championship. In order to win the championship, OU had to beat Arizona and UCLA, the two schools that had won 11 of the previous 12 national titles.
