Questions & Answers:

On campaign finance reform, will you sign McCain-Feingold, as it now stands? Or, in light of the fact that your support for the Hagel amendment failed, will you push for another kind of compromise in the Senate?

- I support campaign finance reform and believe we can pass a law this year. I have submitted to the Congress the principles that will guide me when reviewing the legislation and will continue to listen and work with the Congress to getting it done.
- It's still early in the process, but I've made it clear that if Members of Congress have problems with the current legislation being debated, then they should work to change it and not just sit back and expect me to veto it.

Many environmental groups and members of congress believe reversing your position on CO2, repealing a rule clamping down on arsenic in drinking water, and considering a reversal of the roadless rule that protects 60 million acres from development, is an 'assault on the environment' by your administration. Why are they not wrong in their assessment?

- My administration has taken several bold steps to provide cleaner air and water:
 - My budget provides almost a billion dollars to states and local communities for conservation programs and provides the second largest operating budget ever for the EPA.
 - The first President to require mandatory reductions of pollutants from older power plants.
 - Supported the diesel fuel regulation in an effort to cut down on pollution from diesel trucks
 - Secretary Norton announced the decision to maintain the national monument designations (will work with locals to construct management plans).
- These are reasonable and balanced decisions based on science and facts. My administration will also continue to provide local stakeholders a voice in the process.
- Many of the issues you mentioned are directly related to last-minute decisions made by the previous administration, which were not properly deliberated or based on sound science.

Will you formally withdraw the United States from the Kyoto treaty?

- I take the issue of global warming seriously and my administration is currently reviewing innovative ways of addressing it through new technology and working with our allies and friends.
- As many of you know, the United States Senate rejected the treaty 95-0, so there's nothing to withdraw from. Only one out of 55 countries has moved on the treaty (Romania).
- I have consistently opposed Kyoto because it exempted 80 percent of the world from complying. It's clear we should think differently when it comes to this important issue.

The joint tax committee, which you have quoted recently in support of the President's plan, in the last couple of days came up with an estimate that the estate tax repeal could cost more than \$600 billion, I gather because of loopholes and transactions that would occur. Doesn't that reinforce the Democrats' argument that your tax cut is too big and largely benefits the wealthy?

- The estimate by the Joint Committee on Taxation on repeal of the death tax assumes an immediate, full repeal of death taxes.
- I have proposed a repeal of the death tax over an extended period of years. So this study doesn't apply to my plan.

Was your chief economic advisor, Larry Lindsey, correct in suggesting that you will delay implementation the estate tax repeal to accommodate an immediate tax cut?

- I support providing immediate tax relief to consumers on a retroactive basis. I'm listening to Senators and eager to work with them to get money back to the taxpayers sooner in addition to providing long-term tax relief.

Many independent observers of your presidency have concluded you campaigned as a moderate, but are governing as a hard-line, conservative viewpoint – rolling back ergonomics rules, reversing on CO2, Mexico City policy during the first week in office, labor executive orders, hard line on South Korea, etc. Do you agree?

- I'm doing in office exactly what I said I would do during the campaign. I campaigned on tax relief, reforming public schools, enlisting the help of faith and community-based programs, providing a clear and defined mission for our military. And that's what I have been focused on as President.

ARSENIC

On January 22, 2001, EPA published a Clinton Administration rule lowering the standard from arsenic in drinking water from 50 parts-per-billion to 10 parts-per-billion. The 10 parts-per-billion standard would adversely effect small communities to a great extent, and might actually be too expensive to implement in some communities. Therefore, the effective date of the rule was extended for sixty days on March 19, 2001. The extension was implemented to give time to determine what the most cost-effective standard should be, but the press portrayed the action as merely revoking the rule.

The 50 parts-per-billion standard had been in effect since 1942, and the science is clear that the standard should be more stringent. The EPA is developing a timetable to set a new standard, which is significantly lower than 50 parts per billion.

- My Administration will be improving water quality by implementing significantly tougher standards than currently exist. The current standard has been in effect for more than fifty years and it needs to be made more stringent.
- We want to make sure that the standard we set provides the health protection we seek at an affordable cost – especially to the water providers that serve hundreds of small towns across America.
- I am committed to cleaner drinking water and will ensure the implementation of a significantly more stringent arsenic standard.

Attached for your review are questions and answers along the lines we discussed earlier today.

Questions and Answers for Press Availability

Mr. President, how do you respond to your foreign policy being described as based on “a Cold War mentality” evidenced by your adopting hard line positions with respect to Russia, North Korea and China?

- My foreign policy is based on realism, principles and what’s best for American interests.
- My National Security Policy is based on the type of threats and challenges we are facing today, not the threats of the Cold War world.
- I want to cooperate with other countries where I can and without hesitation.
- I believe in frankly and openly discussing disagreements or areas of concern with other countries, and I will always do so in a respectful way.
- Frankness and realism make for clarity in relations with other countries and in no way prevent us from working together on areas of mutual interest.

Relations with Russia are off to a rocky start. You say you want to have productive relationship with Russia, yet the mass expulsion of diplomats, the State Department receiving the Chechen visitor, the Defense Secretary labeling Russia “a proliferator” all seem designed to provoke the Russians. When does the “productive relationship” begin?

- Russia is a great country and we respect the Russian Federation. Russia can be a threat to us if they decide to, but we do not see Russia as our enemy.
- As I have said before, we will work with Russia in areas of mutual interest.
- We have very successful partnership on some regional issues, including in the Balkans and elsewhere.
- On areas where we don’t find their behavior helpful, we will let them know.

- I am looking forward to meeting President Putin this summer so we can exchange of views, advance our cooperation and work on areas where we disagree.

Mr. President, several recent articles have commented on the split in your foreign policy team between the hawkish hard-liners and the doves. Are you concerned that their inability to agree on tactics, with regard to Iraq or China for example, will harm your ability to make important decisions on these and other issues?

- First of all, it's nonsense. My national security team is extremely close. They speak daily, several times a day, and they are united in providing me the information and advice I need to make decisions.
- Many policies are under review. We inherited a lot of problems and unworkable policies that need considerable overhaul. And it will take some time and some discussion for us to decide how best to do that.
- I am confident I picked the best people for the job and they will help me do the best job for America.

Your hard line on North Korea was a disappointment to the South Koreans. Now the EU has announced it is sending a mission to Pyongyang to "take up the slack" and several foreign policy experts have sent you a letter asking you to resume missile negotiations with the DPRK. Mr. President, how can you pass up the opportunity to reduce the missile threat from North Korea?

- As I told President Kim, I support his "sunshine policy." We're reviewing our policy and haven't made any decisions yet.
- I told him and I've told you, I am skeptical of North Korea. I have concerns about their missile development and exports.
- No one wants more than I do to reduce the threat of missiles to our allies South Korea and Japan, to our friends in the region, and to the U.S. troops within range of those missiles.

- That is why verification must be at the core of any missile agreement with North Korea.

What do you think of the Israeli military operations in the West Bank and Gaza? Were these operations justified?

- It is long past time to end the cycle of violence. All parties should make maximum effort to restore calm and stability.
- There has been a serious escalation in the violence this week, including several horrible terrorist attacks.
- I urge the leaders to speak out in public, clearly and unequivocally, to condemn violence and to take measures to restore calm.

How much violence does there have to be in the Middle East before the United States is motivated to do something?

- The United States is engaged and will continue to be engaged.
- I am involved -- as is Secretary Powell -- in a very intense process of consulting with leaders in the region.
- Our emphasis with all of our contacts is on the need to end the violence.

Why did you veto the UN Security Council resolution?

- We vetoed the resolution as a matter of principle.
- We worked hard with Security Council members to come up with a balanced resolution, but the end result was a resolution that was unbalanced and tried to impose an international observer force without the consent of the parties.
- I want to facilitate the parties' efforts toward peace, not impose solutions on them.

When will you invite Chairman Arafat to the White House?

- We have many channels of communications with the Palestinians. I don't want to say anything today about future invitations.
- I am looking forward to seeing President Mubarak of Egypt on Monday.

What have you done to fulfill your campaign pledge of moving the U.S. embassy to Jerusalem?

- I have asked the Secretary of State to advise me on how this may best be accomplished.
- We have to recognize that the situation on the ground in Israel today is very precarious, and we have to avoid doing anything to make it worse.

Are you worried the situation in Macedonia is getting out of hand?

- I believe the Macedonian government's military response against extremists was measured and appropriate, and I support the government's efforts to preserve democracy and Macedonia's territorial integrity.
- The government should, however, also establish a serious dialogue with legitimately elected ethnic Albanian leaders to address that group's genuine political and economic concerns.
- I think it is also important to note that the majority of ethnic Albanians there do not support the violence committed by extremists.

Will you respond to NATO's call for more troops in Kosovo to seal the Macedonia-Kosovo border?

- I do not anticipate providing any additional troops at this time. We already have over 6,200 U.S. troops in Kosovo and have redeployed a number of these to the border to help tighten security.
- I understand other countries have committed to send more troops and I welcome their contribution.

Will you certify that Yugoslavia is cooperating with the International Criminal Tribunal for Yugoslavia (ICTY)?

- Secretary Powell and other members of the Administration are discussing with the Serbs their progress on meeting the law's conditions, including cooperation with the Tribunal.
- I am working with my foreign policy team to review Serbia's performance on the conditions outlined in the law, and we will have something to say on certification soon.

Have you made a decision on whether to sell AEGIS-equipped destroyers to Taiwan?

- I have not made a decision on that yet.
- I am committed to fulfilling the security and arms sales provisions of the Taiwan Relations Act.

What has Secretary Rumsfeld recommended to you in the defense review? When can we expect those recommendations to be made public?

- I have had, and will have, a number of meetings with Secretary Rumsfeld on the work I have tasked him to conduct.

- These meetings have so far touched mostly on the methodology he is using in this undertaking.
- He has made no specific recommendations to me yet and I have taken no decisions.

Do you plan to withdraw from the Kyoto Protocol?

- I have said clearly that I do not support the Kyoto Protocol. It exempts developing countries and would cause serious harm to the U.S. economy.
- Global climate change is a serious issue, and I have instructed that my administration undertake a Cabinet-level review of U.S. climate change policy.
- At the international level, we will work with our friends and allies through international processes to develop alternative approaches to climate change.

Will you seek to “unsign” the Kyoto Protocol?

- This is not an option we are currently looking at.

What comment do you have for critics abroad who say your decision to not support Kyoto is irresponsible?

- Once the policy review is completed, I will review its findings and decide what policies we should pursue at home and internationally.
- I am optimistic that, working constructively with our friends and allies through international processes, we can develop technologies, market-based incentives, and other innovative approaches to combating global climate change.
