I. PURPOSE

To meet with Secretary Gale Norton and Secretary Ann Veneman for a briefing on the upcoming wildfire season and Tuesday's House vote on your Healthy Forests Initiative (HFI).

To make remarks on the anticipated wildfire season outlook and to encourage House and Senate passage of your HFI.

II. BACKGROUND

Last year, 7.2 million acres burned due to wildfires. In August, you announced your Healthy Forests Initiative to (1) significantly step up efforts to prevent the damage catastrophic wildfires cause by reducing unnecessary regulatory obstacles that hinder active and sensible forest management; (2) work with Congress to pass legislation that addresses the unhealthy forests crisis by expediting procedures for forest thinning and restoration projects; and (3) fulfill the promise of the 1994 Northwest Forest Plan to ensure sustainable forest management and appropriate timber production. Several aspects of HFI are being handled administratively, including the improvement of the environmental review process, endangered species consultations, and the appeals process.

On the legislative front, Congress passed a stewardship contracting provision in the FY 03 budget bill, which allows Federal agencies to enter into long-term contracts for thinning services in exchange for the wood products removed. The dual benefits are significant savings to the Federal Government for thinning out forests and local economic development. This year, the House has a bill with 130 cosponsors (17 Democrats), representing all regions of the country. The House will vote on this legislation Tuesday afternoon. The proposed bill establishes procedures to expeditiously implement forest restoration and wildfire mitigation projects on Forest Service and BLM lands (1) near communities in the wildland urban interface; (2) on high risk lands in the proximity of municipal water sources; (3) on high risk lands that encompass habitat for threatened and endangered species where Federal wildlife officials have identified catastrophic wildfire as a threat to the viability of the species; and (4) on high risk landscapes particularly susceptible to disease or bug infestation. The bill protects valuable wilderness and roadless areas.

Remarks on the Healthy Forests Initiative
May 20, 2003
Draft #5

Good morning, and welcome to the White House. I am pleased all of you could be here to support the preservation of a great American treasure, our forests.

Nine months ago, I stood at the scene of the Squires Peak fire in Oregon. On one side of a dirt road, where small trees and underbrush had been removed before the fire rolled through, the forest was green and alive. On the other side, where a similar thinning project had been stalled by lawsuits, the landscape was charred and the trees looked like matchsticks.

The contrast between these two sides of the forest was startling, and tragic. Active forest management could have saved both areas, and it could save millions more acres across America from the devastation of severe forest fires and insect damage. Yet for too many years, bureaucratic tangles and bad forest policy have prevented foresters from keeping our woodlands healthy and safe. The cost to America has been high – in the loss of lives and property, and the destruction of woodlands and wildlife.

No region in America is immune to this problem. Wildfires, diseases, and insect infestations threaten the habitat of animals and diminish the quality of our water. And problems on public lands hurt private lands, too, by leaping across boundary lines to destroy homes, farms, ranches, and towns.

The Healthy Forests Initiative that I announced last summer is making American woodlands more safe, acre by acre. As we approach the start of fire season, we have a responsibility to do even more to protect our forests – and we will meet that responsibility.

I also want to thank all the professional firefighters who are here today representing their agencies. These brave men and women devote their professional lives to protecting our homes and communities. And America is grateful.

Last year, 23 firefighters died while battling disastrous forest fires. Those fires scorched about 7 million acres – more than double the average of the last 10 years. Major blazes burned in 15 states across the country, destroying 815 homes and other buildings, and costing taxpayers 1.6 billion dollars for fire suppression.

The economic impact of these wildfires, and of mismanaged forests, is widespread. Hard-working Americans and the communities that count on healthy forests are suffering. Since 1989, five Western states – Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, and California – have lost 47,000 timber jobs. And 400 mills have closed in those states.

At present, this year's fire outlook seems less severe. Yet the danger persists, and many of our forests are facing a higher than normal risk of costly and catastrophic fires. The communities from Georgia to California

that are at significant risk for those fires will need our help. And they will have it.

Wildfires in unnaturally overgrown forests burn hotter, and spread faster, than normal fires, and their effects on the environment can be devastating. They sterilize soils and trigger soil erosion. They decimate our forests, killing even giant Sequoias that have survived centuries of smaller fires. And they destroy the habitats of endangered species. Last year, the fire in Hayman, Colorado, damaged the habitat of several species, including the Mexican spotted owl.

One reason for these deadly fires is found in decades of well-intentioned but misguided forest policy, which has allowed dangerous undergrowth to build up on the forest floor. During seasonal droughts, these small trees and underbrush act as ladders for ground fires to reach the tops of our oldest and tallest trees. And they make forests vulnerable to insect infestation and disease.

Sound science shows that we can prevent such fires, by managing forests with controlled fire, cleaning out the underbrush, and thinning the areas that are vulnerable to intense fires and insect attacks. This is common sense, and it is the consensus of scientists, wildlife biologists, forestry professionals, and firefighters – the very people who have dedicated their lives to keeping our forests healthy and our communities safe.

Andrea Gilham, who is up here with me today, is a fire management officer and a member of the Blackfeet tribe in Browning, Montana. She has been fighting fire since she was 19 and she has a degree in Forest Resource Management.

Andrea knows the cost of doing too little to prevent extreme wildfires. In 1990, she was working the front lines of the Dude fire in Arizona's Tonto National Forest on the day six firefighters died. Andrea says, "Everybody knows what we need to do. . . . The longer we wait, the more likelihood a catastrophic wildfire is going to happen. Lives and property are going to be at risk."

Through the Healthy Forests Initiative, we have begun to cut the bureaucratic red tape that endangers firefighters and prevents foresters

from doing their jobs. Since 2000, the federal government has more than doubled the amount of money budgeted for fire fighting and fire prevention work in our forests, and we have budgeted an eight percent increase for 2004. So far this year, we have reduced the undergrowth that fuels fires on more than 1.3 million acres of forest and rangelands – nearly twice as many as were treated in 2001.

We are moving at a record-setting pace, and we still have a long way to go. One-hundred-and-ninety million acres are vulnerable to these devastating fires. For the sake of our forests and the safety of our communities, we must act quickly. I call on Congress to act now and pass the Healthy Forest Restoration Act. This bipartisan bill, which the House will vote on today, builds on the success of my Healthy Forest Initiative. It sets the goal of thinning trees, cleaning out underbrush, and restoring the health of 20 million acres. It sets priorities for forest management, by authorizing work in the areas that are closest to rural communities, and at greatest risk for environmental damage. The Healthy Forest Restoration Act helps the people closest to the problem – by allowing local citizens to help plan projects for non-profit, for-profit, and stewardship groups. And these citizens can benefit economically from selling the smaller trees that are cleaned out of forests.

Local citizens can be great allies in this effort. Ron Bell is with us today. Ron spent 22 years in the Army before coming home to manage his family cattle and tree farm near Batesville, Arkansas. About six years ago, when Ron noticed the health of the forests in his area deteriorating from insect infestation, he decided to do something about it. Ron, his wife, and their two sons spent an entire winter cleaning out the diseased and lower-quality trees that were crowding out the taller trees in his 40-acre forest. When he was finished, the forest was healthier, the bugs were gone, and he had made about 15,000 dollars from the sale of the undergrowth that he cleared away.

Today, Ron belongs to a group of nearly 200 landowners in central Arkansas, who are working to manage their woodlands and keep the bugs out. Ron says some of the landowners who live near national forest areas are worried, because the government moves too slowly in treating its own forests.

Ron says, "These conditions are preventable with a little bit of management. You don't just have to throw up your hands ... There are times you need to get in there quickly when the situation is dire."

The situation is dire and Congress must act. I call upon the House and Senate to support this bill, and pass it before the fire season starts next month.

Our forests are a treasure, and we are the stewards. We must preserve them, and we must protect the people and communities who depend on them. And we must fulfill our promise to the next generation, to leave behind a world as blessed and beautiful as the one our parents left to us.

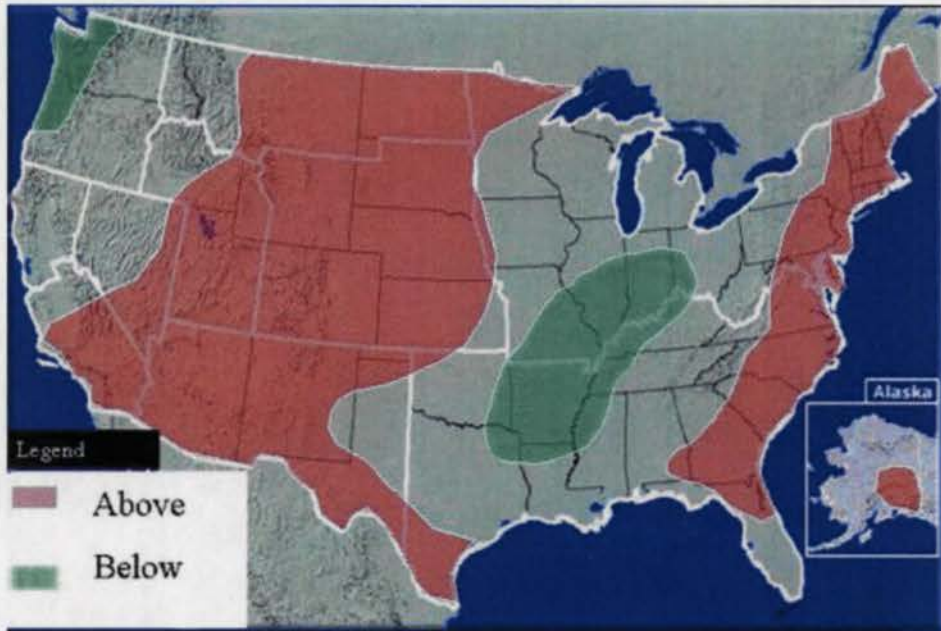

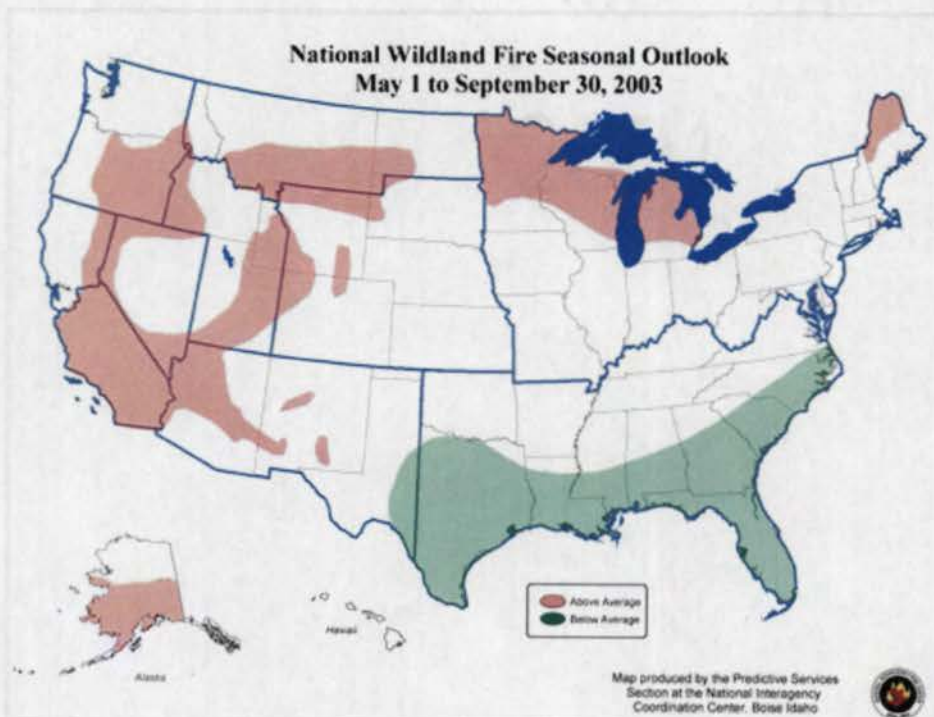

POINTS TO BE MADE FOR MEETING WITH
CUBAN DISSIDENTS AND FAMILIES OF POLITICAL PRISONERS

- I admire your courage and that of your families in the face of such dehumanizing treatment.
- Cuba is the only country in the Western Hemisphere that is regularly singled out for systematic human rights abuses.
- My Administration places great importance on respecting human rights in Latin America in general, Cuba in particular.
- In U.S. foreign policy, Cuba matters. Other countries now know this.
- I am disappointed at Cuba's re-admission into the U.N. Human Rights Commission.
- The current crackdown on peaceful political opposition is a sign of the Castro regime's weakness, not strength.
- The United States is committed to highlighting human rights issues in Cuba and to working with the international community to seek the prompt release of these brave individuals.
- The Inter-American Democratic Charter states in Article 1: "The peoples of the Americas have a right to democracy and their governments have an obligation to promote and defend it." We will work with our Hemispheric allies to bring the reality of this statement to Cuba.

The United States will continue to support all the peaceful pro-democracy activists within Cuba. Now is not the time to back away from democratic ideals.

BACKGROUND ON ROUNDTABLE PARTICIPANTS

Mario Chanes de Armas [CHAH-nes de armas]

Mario is a 76-year-old former labor leader who participated in the Castro-led attack on Batista's Moncada Barracks on July 26, 1953. He and Castro were jailed for two years by Batista. In 1956, he and Castro returned to Cuba on the ship *Granma*, and they fought together in the revolution which ended in 1959. Sometime later, Mario complained to Castro that the Revolution was turning communist, which was not good for Cuba. He was jailed by Castro for 30 years, longer than Nelson Mandela.

Maritza Lugo [mar-IT-za LU-go]

Maritza is 43 years old. She and her husband have been jailed multiple times for organizing non-violent groups of families of political prisoners demanding better treatment in jails and for organizing groups of independent farmers who demanded better prices for their products from state monopolies. Because of their actions, their small plot of land was confiscated. (b)(6)

Blanca Gonzalez

Blanca is representing her son, Normando Hernandez. Normando is a 33-year-old independent journalist who is now in jail for practicing journalism without permission of the government. He wrote articles of community interest discussing the inability or failure of the government to provide social services.

Angel de Fana [FAH-nah]

Angel spent 20 years in prison for "activities against the security of the State." He was a "plantado" (The literal translation is "stuck in the ground."), refusing "rehabilitation" through indoctrination, which would have lessened his sentence.

Ernesto Diaz

Ernesto was a fisherman in pre-Castro Cuba who was jailed for 22 years for "counter-revolutionary activities." While in prison, he wrote poetry and children's stories that later earned him world-wide acclaim.

Eusebio Penalver [u-SAY-bee-oh PEN-al-ver]

Eusebio fought against Batista with Che Guevara. After the revolution, he saw that the communists were taking over and moved to the mountains to fight Castro. He was captured and spent 28 years in jail. He received particularly harsh treatment because he is Afro-Cuban. While being beaten, he was told by his captors that he was an "ungrateful black" for taking up arms against Castro.

Ana Lazara Rodriguez

Ana is a medical doctor who struggled against Batista and then Castro. She spent 19 years in prison under Castro. She wrote a book detailing the brutal treatment of women in Castro's political prisons.

Ramon Colas [coh-LAS]

Along with his wife, Ramon founded the independent library movement in Cuba. These modest collections of books in private homes, which the government considers subversive, grew around the country. Castro's Security forces ransacked Colas' house, scattering all his books on the street, and forced his family to flee.

Isabel Roque [roh-KAY]

Isabel is the sister of Marta Beatriz Roque, who is an independent economist and dissident. Marta has been jailed for writing economic and political analyses exposing the failure of Castro's regime. She was sentenced to 20 years in prison for violating the law against revealing any information having to do with Cuba's economy.

Nancy Avila

Nancy is the mother of Pablo Pacheco. Pablo is a 33-year-old independent journalist who wrote about conditions of political prisoners and their families. He was jailed for "conspiracy against the power of the State."

Basilio Guzman [GOOZ-mahn]

Basilio was originally a pro-Castro activist. He turned against Castro after it became apparent that communism was taking control. He was jailed for 22 years and became a "plantado," refusing indoctrination-based rehabilitation.
