Animal Cruelty Act is needed

How would you feel if someone poured kerosene on your dogs and set them on fire? Threw your cat out the window of a moving car while yelling obscenities? Stabbed your horse to death?

What punishment should someone receive for hanging his ex-girlfriend's dog on her mailbox in a fit of rage? Maliciously starving his dog to death in his backyard, ignoring the dog's cries for food? These highly publicized cases of animal cruelty all occurred in Arkansas in the last few years.

Those of us working to get the Arkansas Animal Cruelty Act on the November ballot think that people who torture animals should be classified as felons and that judges should have the opportunity to give such perpetrators more than one year in jail. Wouldn't you want to know if someone who tortured animals applied to work at your child's school? A background check would catch a felony conviction, but not a misdemeanor conviction.

Hunting, fishing and agriculture are specifically exempted from the act. The Arkansas Game and Fish Commission actually wrote the language that exempts hunting and fishing.

People who torture animals often move on to hurting people. If you think that people who torch, starve, stab and hang animals deserve a felony conviction and more than a year in jail, please sign a petition to help Arkansas become the 35th state with tough animal cruelty laws.

First, we have to get Officer Terry Hastings off of TV and onto the parking lot. I know this can't happen because he makes way too much money. If we can pay a meter maid to give tickets for \$10, I think we could pay a handicap maid to give tickets worth \$100 to \$500.

My wife is handicapped and can't walk. We have to use a wheelchair when we go shopping. Every time we go shopping, some car pulls in front of us in the handicapped space. There will be three or four young people jump out and dance and jive into the store. They may have a handicap card, but it belongs to their dead grandma or sick aunt. The person the card is issued to is supposed to be in the car. I know the handicap maid will have to call in to see whose name is on the card, but the amount of money the [city] could make is worth it.

I know that in Sherwood at Wal-Mart and two or three grocery stores, they could give at least 25 to 30 a day. That's about \$3,000 per day. Put one person in North Little Rock and three people in Little Rock; that's \$15,000 per day. Just think of statewide. This money [could go] to Medicaid because most handicapped people are on Medicaid.

Stop partisan posturing

In 1998, Sen. Patrick Leahy of Vermont was outspoken in his criticism of the Senate leadership for not confirming more of President Bill Clinton's judicial nominees. Now, however, Leahy, who is chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, has no problem delaying the confirmation of almost 100 of President Bush's judicial nominees.

Leahy's partisan tactics have left the country with more vacancies than in 1998 when he referred to the situation as a "judicial vacancy crisis."

I find it very troubling that at a time of unparalleled national unity, partisan politics is derailing these judicial confirmations. Our state is directly affected by Leahy's lack of leadership. Lavenski Smith has been nominated by Bush to serve on the 8th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, which includes Arkansas. The American Bar Association has rated him as qualified to serve on the court. The only thing that is stopping these nominees from being confirmed is Leahy's desire to play political games with our court system.

It's time for Tom Daschle and other Senate leaders to tell Leahy to stop the partisan posturing and confirm these nominees. Our judicial system is already overburdened and prolonged vacancies will only make the problem worse.

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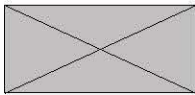

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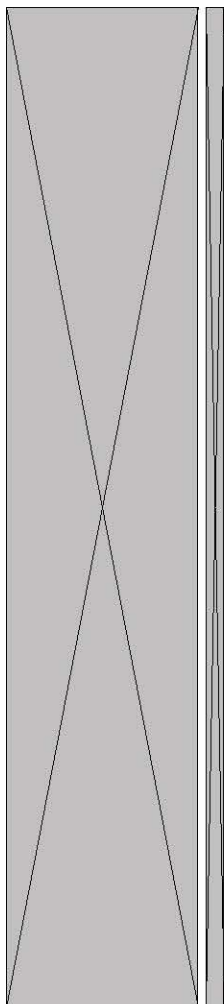
